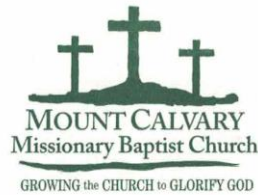

Discipline and forgiveness in the church Matthew 18: 15 – 35

In Matthew chapter 18 Jesus gave specific instructions to His disciple and the Church, that is to all that have accepted Him as Lord of their life. In other words, Jesus teaches us that, if we don't forgive one another, then God will not forgive us. This forgiveness that Jesus is speaking about have nothing to do with our eternal salvation, for God has already given us eternal life through the death of His Son Jesus Christ. This forgiveness is what we need for us to enjoy our fellowship with God, and our relationship with one another.

Discipline and forgiveness in the church part V

Matthew 18: 27 – 29

- I. The King was moved with compassion, the King released the servant of all he owed, in other words the servant secured a complete cancellation of all that he owed (Ver 27).
- II. The same servant went out from the presence of the King, and found a fellow servant who owed him one hundred days pay, and demanded his fellow servant to pay him all (Ver. 28).
- III. The servant forgot so quickly that the King had just forgiven him all the money, that he owed the King and could not repay him.
- IV. The servant began to threaten his fellow servant and to do him bodily harm, if he did not pay him all his money immediately (Ver. 29).
- V. The fellow servant asked for time, and he will repay everything that he owed, but his fellow servant would not except anything, but a full payment must be made (Ver. 29).

Note: When we consider how much God has forgiven us, we must be willing to forgive one another for their sins against us.
